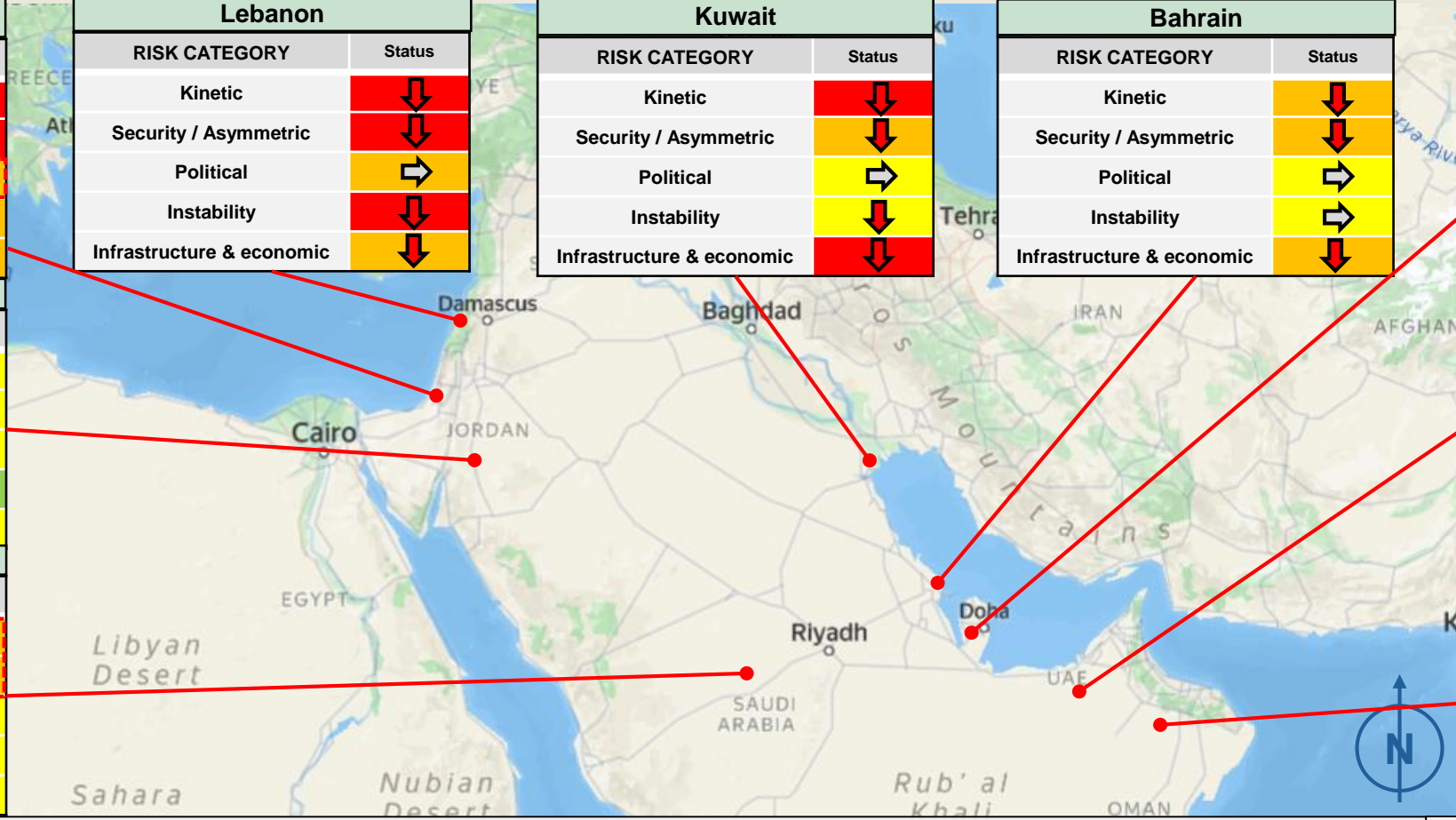

ASSESSMENT: Over the 7-day window, the main regional pattern remains **steady escalation with widening target sets**, especially against **energy, port, airport, and digital infrastructure** in the Gulf, while **Israel and Lebanon** remain the most intense direct conflict theatres. The most noticeable change today is that **the UAE and Kuwait both show stronger evidence of cumulative operational degradation**, not just interception activity. In Kuwait, this is visible in fresh damage to refinery, power, and desalination infrastructure. In the UAE, it is visible in casualties at Habshan, further debris impacts in Dubai, and the extended shutdown outlook for the Al Taweelah site.

The tripwire logic is increasingly being met not only through **incoming projectiles** but through **successful impacts near key infrastructure and populated areas**, which supports the continued Level 4 assessment for selected categories in Kuwait and the UAE. Saudi Arabia, Bahrain, and Qatar remain below that threshold overall, but all three continue to sit in a **persistent Level 3-type environment** marked by repeated alerts, interceptions, and rising exposure to regional system disruption. Jordan and Oman remain more contained, but neither is insulated from second-order effects. Jordan continues to experience debris, injuries, and transit-related exposure, while Oman remains deeply tied to the Hormuz operating picture. Lebanon remains on a worsening path, with fresh embassy departure language, further Beirut strikes, and continued Hezbollah activity. Israel also remains under sustained multi-source attacks.

Notes: Data has been used from the Daily Eigenrac Intelligence brief to identify current Security levels. The trend data has been extracted from the past 7 day reporting window.
